Officers in Southwest Division have been working extremely hard to reduce crime, provide a safe environment and a better quality of life for the community of Southwest Division.

## **3SLO1-ADAMS BOULEVARD NEIGHBORHOOD**

### **Crime Trends**

In the first eleven months of the year, the Adams Boulevard neighborhood experienced considerably low crime. Senior Lead Officer(SLO) Sergio Sanchez reports that there were no crime clusters(5 or more crimes in a reporting district). Unfortunately, some residents of the Adams Boulevard community did report burglary incidents in the area of Rodeo Road, between La Brea and Clyde Avenue, and also on Cochran Avenue between Blackwelder and Hauser. Please remember to lock your windows and doors when you leave for work in the morning. If you are going to be on vacation for a lengthy period of time, please notify Senior Lead Officer Sanchez as he may be able to facilitate extra patrol for you.

### **Crime Tips-Shopping with Children**

*If possible, leave small children at home with a trusted babysitter.*

*Teach your child to go to a store clerk and ask for help in case your child is separated from you.*

*Teach children to stay close to you at all times while shopping.*

*Never allow children to make unaccompanied trips to the restroom.*

*Children should never be allowed to go to the car alone and they should never be left alone in the car.*

*Teach your children their full name, address and telephone number to give to police officers or mall security. Teach children to immediately inform you if a stranger is bothering them.*



## **3SLO15-WEST ADAMS NEIGHBORHOOD**

### **Crime Trends**

#### Crime Trends

Senior Lead Officer Sam Salazar reported that the North University Park area experienced a high number of auto related crimes during the month of November. These crimes were highly concentrated in the area from the 10 Freeway to the north, down to Jefferson Blvd on the south, and from Normandie on the west, to Hoover Street on the east. Southwest officers conducted an auto theft/crime suppression detail on November 24<sup>th</sup>, 2009 which yielded several misdemeanor arrests and citations. #### Crime Tips-Shopping

Follow these helpful tips while out shopping during the holiday season.

*Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.*

*Dress casually and comfortably.*

*Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.*

*Do not carry a purse or wallet, if possible.*

*Always carry your California Driver License or Identification Card along with necessary cash, checks and/or a credit card you expect to use.*

*Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.*

*Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.*

*Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.*

*Keep cash in your front pocket.*

*Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.*

*Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.*

*Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.*

*Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.*

*Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.*



### [3SLO31-JEFFERSON PARK](#)

#### Crime Trends

Senior Lead Officer Biondo reports that while burglary crimes were down significantly throughout Southwest Division during the month of November 2009, there were numerous residential burglaries in

the Jefferson Park area. These crimes primarily appear to be clustered between Coliseum Street/Exposition Boulevard and Crenshaw Boulevard /Chesapeake Avenue. Additionally, there was a clustering of incidents in the area bounded by Bronson Avenue/10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Exposition Boulevard/Montclair Street. Residents are encouraged to fully secure their residence, cut overgrown shrubbery and improve lighting around their home.

During the same time period there were also four shootings within Jefferson Park. The most notable occurred on November 1, 2009. At that time Officers responded to a shooting call in the area of Jefferson Boulevard and Hillcrest Avenue. They observed several individuals walking in the alley, one of whom carried an assault rifle. Officers detained, arrested suspects, and later recovered additional firearms and ammunition from one suspect's residence.

The holiday season is traditionally the time of year where property crimes, (including thefts, burglaries, burglaries from motor vehicles and grand theft auto), spike. To that end, residents are reminded to be aware of their surroundings and secure their valuables, vehicles and residences at all times.

As the precarious economic situation within the nation continues, individuals are discovering new ways of making money. One of the most problematic activities, are after hour, underground clubs.



Typically an individual or individuals rent a vacant warehouse or storefront from an oftentimes unsuspecting landlord. They then advertise (mainly through flyers and the internet) about the location. Depending on the level of marketing, these parties attract large crowds. Generally, these parties are unregulated and many are open to persons 18 yrs or younger. Furthermore, most if not all of these locations serve alcohol and are open from 1:00 am until 6:00 am or later. All of this activity occurs without any permits or regulations. The corresponding crowds exacerbate the limited parking problem, leading to debris and noise problems and contribute to additional property and nuisance issues. Upon becoming aware of this activity citizens should, (only if it is safe), obtain as much information about all individuals and vehicles involved.

If the situation rises to the level of an emergency, immediately call 9-1-1 and relay all of the information you have recorded.

*Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Any cash you do carry place it in your front pockets.*

*Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.*

*When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.*

*Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.*

*Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.*

*Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.*

*Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.*

*Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows. Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked your car.*

## 3SLO41-BALWIN HILLS/VISTA AND VILLAGE GREEN

### Crime Trends

There have been several community meetings that have been attended by Senior Lead Officer (SLO) Kevan Beard in the Baldwin Hills, Baldwin Vista, and Village Green communities. At these meetings crime statistics and crime prevention tips are given out. ## 3SLO55-WESTERN CORRIDOR AND JEFFERSON PARK

### Crime Trends

Senior Lead Officer Pierre Olega reported that Jefferson Park and the Western Park area experienced an increase in graffiti. Operation Clean Sweep (OCS)

operates a graffiti hotline at 800 / 611-CITY ( or 800 / 611-2489 ). Residents may report graffiti and also establish a work order through community-based graffiti removal agencies. These agencies supervise community volunteers, as well as juveniles and adults who are ordered to perform community service from an appointed judge. Work is performed using paint, chemical solvents or sandblasting, depending on the type of surface. All services are free of charge.

### **Crime Tips-Burglary Prevention**

*Keep all doors locked at night and every time you leave your home.*

*Use doors that feature wide-angle peepholes at heights everyone can use.*

*If you have glass panels near or in doors, make sure glass is reinforced so they cannot be shattered.*

*Make sure the door leading from the attached garage to the house is solid wood or metal-clad and protected with a quality keyed door lock and deadbolt.*

*Lock the overhead garage door - do not just rely on an automatic door opener.*

*Make sure sliding glass doors have strong, working key locks.*

*Keep grills, lawnmowers and other valuables in a locked garage or shed.*

*Store firearms unloaded and locked in storage boxes and secured with trigger guard locks.*

*Inscribe valuable items, such as televisions, stereos and computers with an identifying number approved by your local police.*

*Have an up-to-date home inventory that includes pictures. Keep a complete copy somewhere outside of the house.*

*Never leave a message on your answering machine that indicates you may be away from home.*

*If you hear an intruder while at home, leave safely if you can, then call police. If you can't leave, lock yourself in a room with a phone and call police. If an intruder is in your room, pretend you are asleep.*

*Trim all shrubbery that could conceal criminal activity near doors and windows.*

*Consider using timed interior lights and outdoor timed or motion lights to make your home appear occupied when you are away.*

*If you park your car outside, never leave a garage door opener inside your vehicle.*

### **3SLO57-UNIVERSITY VILLAGE (USC)**

#### **Crime Trends**

The USC area has continued to experience bike thefts and Burglary from Motor Vehicles (BFMV). The primary reason that suspects are taking advantage of the USC area is because some students fail to lock and secure their bikes. Students are urged to buy a sturdy lock and make sure to lock their bikes to a fixed object, preferably a bike rack. As for Burglary from Motor Vehicles, this crime has continued due to

victims failing to remove their personal property out of plain view. Although, Southwest police officers will continue to patrol this area, students are encouraged to take preventative measures to impede their chances of becoming a victim of a crime.

*If you must use an ATM, choose one that is located inside a police station, mall, or well-lighted location. Withdraw only the amount of cash what you need.*

*Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.*

*Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.*



## 3SLO63-BALDWIN VILLAGE

### Crime Trends

Last month, Senior Lead Officer Thomsen reported a series of burglaries that have been occurring during daytime hours on Hillcrest Drive between Martin Luther King Boulevard and Santo Tomas Drive. Since Senior Lead Officer Thomsen and her team of officers have been actively working these areas, minimum crime has been reported. Officer Thomsen would like the citizens of the community to report suspicious activity in their area and she assures the community that this area will continue to be monitored. ### Crime Trends-Identity Theft

The LAPD suggests the following crime prevention techniques to avoid becoming a victim of Identity Theft:

*To minimize the amount of information an identity thief can steal, do not carry extra credit cards, a social security card, birth certificate or passport in your wallet or purse, except when needed.*

*To reduce the amount of personal information that is in circulation, one should consider the following:*

*Remove your name from the marketing lists of the three major credit reporting bureaus, i.e., [Equifax](#), [Experian](#) (formerly TRW) and [Trans Union](#). This will limit the number of pre-approved offers of credit that you receive. These offers, if thrown away in the trash, are potential targets of identity thieves who will use them to order credit cards using your identity.*

*Sign up for the [Direct Marketing Association Mail Preference Service](#) and the [Telephone Preference Service](#). By doing this, your name*

*is added to computerized name deletion lists used by nationwide marketers.*

*Have your name and address removed from telephone books and reverse directories.*

*Install a locked mailbox at your residence or business to reduce mail theft or use a post office box.*

*When you order new checks, do not have them sent to your home address. Have them sent to a post office box or arrange to pick them up at your bank.*

*When you pay bills, do not place the envelopes containing your checks in your home mailbox for the letter carrier to pick up.*

*If stolen, your checks can be altered and cashed by identity thieves. It is best to mail your checks and other sensitive mail at the post office rather than your home or neighborhood mailbox. Write checks with a fine-point permanent marker.*

*Pay bills with an electronic bill payment service.*

*Reduce the number of credit cards you actively use to a bare minimum. Carry only one or two credit cards in your wallet. Cancel all unused credit card accounts. Even though you do not use these accounts, account numbers are recorded in your credit report along with other data that can be used by identity thieves.*

*Never give out your credit card number or other personal information over the telephone, unless you have a trusted business relationship with the person or company and you have initiated the telephone call.*

*Order your credit report once a year from each of the three major credit bureaus to check for inaccuracies and fraudulent use of your accounts. Make sure that you recognize every line of information established in your file.*

*Always take credit card receipts with you. Never throw them in a public trash container.*

*Watch the mail when you expect a new or reissued credit card to arrive. Contact the issuer if the card does not arrive.*

### 3SLO73-LEIMERT PARK AND THE CRENSHAW CORRIDOR

#### Crime Trends

In the first week of November, Senior Lead Officer Sasajima advised the Leimert Park community was hit by a noticeable increase in Burglary from Motor Vehicles (BFMV). In each of these reported incidents, the rear passenger-side windows were smashed, in order to gain entry into the vehicle. Items taken included various electronics (stereos, iPods, GPS). The majority of these incidents have occurred at night. During one of these incidents, a resident observed a suspect entering a neighbor's vehicle around 2 o'clock in the morning. Please take caution not to leave any valuables in your vehicles, and if you do, please take measures not to leave them visible through the windows. As always, if you see any suspicious activity, be a good neighbor and report it immediately.

Residential burglaries while fewer in numbers, continue to plague the Leimert Park community. Southwest Burglary Detectives have been hard at work, conducting follow-ups on information provided by residents. Recently, residents on the 3700 block of Roxton Avenue provided information on a vehicle used by suspects in a burglary of one of their neighbors. Southwest Burglary detectives were able to locate the vehicle and take one suspect in custody. As it turned out, several laptops and electronic equipment were discovered inside the vehicle, which was able to be traced to a number of burglaries that had occurred in the city of Inglewood. The suspect was able to be linked to these burglaries and was subsequently arrested and booked.

## Crime Tips-Telemarketing Scams



Many legitimate companies sell their products or services through telemarketing by either calling consumers or advertising a number for consumers to call. Charities also use telemarketing techniques, and unfortunately fraudulent telemarketers rob people every day, using phones as their weapons. The following are tips to help protect yourself from Telemarketing scams.

1. Know who you're dealing with. If the company or charity is unfamiliar, check it out with your state or local consumer protection agency and the Better Business Bureau. Call the LAPD Police Commission if the charity involves law enforcement 800-339-6868.

2. Be aware that "no complaint" is no guarantee. Fraudulent operators open and close quickly, so the fact that no one has made a complaint yet doesn't mean that the company or charity is legitimate. You still need to look for other danger signs of fraud.

3. Don't believe promises of easy money. If someone claims that you can earn money with little or no work, get a loan or credit card even if you have bad credit or make money on an investment with little or no risk, it's probably a scam. One should always remember, that an offer that sounds too good to be true, probably is.

4. Think twice before entering contests operated by unfamiliar companies. Fraudulent marketers sometimes use contest entry forms to identify potential victims.

5. Never pay to play. It's illegal for a company to require you to buy something or pay a fee in order to win or claim a prize. Buying something doesn't improve your chances of winning.

6. Resist pressure. Legitimate companies will be happy to send you detailed information and give you time to make a decision. It is probably a scam if the marketer demands that you act immediately or will not take "No" for an answer.

7. Guard your personal information. Only provide your credit card or bank account number when you are actually paying for something. Do not give your social security number to a telemarketer.

8. Senior citizens are particularly vulnerable to scams that take advantage of people who live alone. Seniors need to be wary when dealing with salespersons, particularly over the phone.

9. A common scam to be aware of is the "Canadian lottery scam". The potential victims are contacted over the phone and are told that they have won

several million dollars in the Canadian lottery. However in order to receive the winning money, the victims are told that they need to pay taxes on the winning money, usually several thousand dollars. The victims are instructed to send cashiers checks to various post office box locations in either the United States or Canada, defrauding the victims of their money.

10. Use common sense and ask for names, addresses and call back phone numbers. If you feel suspicious simply hang up. If you are victimized contact the LAPD, Commercial Crimes Division, Fraud Section 213-485-3795 for advice and assistance.

### 3SLO99-VERMONT SQUARE

#### Crime Trends:

Senior Lead Officer Sean Anderson advises that “Street Robberies” are becoming an issue in the area of Vermont Avenue and Martin Luther King Boulevard. They are occurring during evening hours and generally seem to take place at designated bus stops. The suspects have been described only as young males. The victims are often people wearing jewelry or carrying cell phones.

Remember to try and avoid wearing any expensive jewelry visible. Avoid carrying Ipods or cell phones in your hands. If you witness or are a victim of a robbery, do not confront the suspect(s). Be a good witness. Get a good description of the suspects and report that information immediately to the police. Check for a direction of travel or location they flee to and update a police dispatcher. Report any suspicious people who are standing around bus stops and not getting on the bus.



#### Crime Tips-Anonymous Reporting
