Crime Trends

During the beginning March, Senior Lead Officer Hauter reports that the West Adams community experienced a rash of Burglary From Motor Vehicles(BFMV) in the area of south of Adams Boulevard between Halldale Street and Budlong Avenue. Suspects were breaking into vehicles that were parked along the 2700 and 3000 block of Adams Boulevard. The good news is that Southwest patrol officers made a significant arrest in the area and since that arrest, BFMV crime has significantly decreased.



The West Adams Avenues has also been experiencing an increase in thefts. This area is well known for students who walk home or wait for a bus after attending Fredrick Douglas High School. It is very important for parents to make sure their children are not bringing valuables to schools such as gold chains, Apple IPODS, Cell Phones etc. Those are items usually taken by suspects in street robberies.

3SLO19-NORTH UNIVERSITY PARK

Crime Trends

Senior Lead Officer(SLO) Salazar reports that auto related crimes started off at a high rate during the later part of February and beginning of March. The affected area is from the 10 freeway south to Adams Boulevard and from Vermont Avenue to Figueroa Street. In response, Southwest Division will be providing extra patrol and distributing crime prevention fliers in the affected areas.

Crime Tips Robbery Prevention & Small Businesses

Robbery doesn't occur as often as other crimes against businesses, but the potential for loss can be much greater from a single incident. Also, robbery involves force or threat of force and can result in serious injury or death.

Greet every person who enters the business in a friendly manner. Personal contact can discourage a would-be criminal.

Keep windows clear of displays or signs and make sure your business is well-lighted. Check the layout of your store, eliminating any blind spots that may hide a robbery in progress.

Provide information about your security systems to employees only on a "need-to-know" basis. Instruct your employees to report any suspicious activity or person immediately and write down the information for future reference.

Place cash registers in the front section of the store. This increases the chances of someone spotting a robbery in progress and reporting it to the police.

Keep small amounts of cash in the register to reduce losses. Use a drop safe into which large bills and excess cash are dropped by employees and cannot be retrieved by them. Post signs alerting would-be robbers of this procedure.

Make bank deposits often and during business hours. Don't establish a pattern, take different routes at different times during the day. Ask a police officer to escort you to the bank whenever possible.

Ask local law enforcement what to do in case you are robbed. Make sure your address is visible so emergency vehicles can easily find your business.

If you or your employees are confronted by a robber, cooperate. Merchandise and cash can always be replaced—people can't!



3SLO31-JEFFERSON PARK

Crime Trends

The most serious and shocking crimes are those involving or comprised of shootings. While overall violent crime has decreased significantly in the Jefferson Park area, Senior Lead Officer Biondo reports the following incidents have occurred during the last four-five week period:

On February 23, 2010 at 7:00 pm on Arlington and 27th Street, two male Hispanic victims were struck by gunfire multiple times as they drove north in the alley. The assailant is still outstanding at this time

On March 16, 2010 at 10:55 am, on 30th Street and Crenshaw, a male black victim walked west on 30th Street. He was approached by a lone male black assailant. The suspect shot at the victim multiple times, missing him. The suspect then fled south on Crenshaw into a waiting vehicle. The vehicle drove south on Crenshaw Boulevard at a high rate of speed.

On March 16, 2010 at 9:35 pm on 5001 Rodeo Road, (Rancho Cienega Park), a witness observed 3 male black victims sitting in the park. The witness then observed a dark colored SUV drive by the victims and shoot at them multiple times. Fortunately no one was injured.

Crime Tips-Real Estate Fraud

Real estate schemes, scams, and fraud all constitute a form of theft which criminals use to steal your home or real property. Adhering to the principle that a person's home is their castle, this is possibly the most devastating form of victimization. The Los Angeles Police Department will investigate complaints of real estate fraud and the Los Angeles County District Attorney will prosecute these offenders to the fullest extent of the law.

Real estate fraud can take many forms. The information provided below will hopefully serve as an educational tool to help you become more aware of the various forms of real estate fraud and how you can avoid becoming a victim.



Types of Real Estate

Fraud con artists may use several methods to swindle you in a real estate fraud scheme. Foreclosure bailout, home equity fraud, home renovation scams, rental fraud, and deceptive timeshare scams, are just a few types of real estate fraud which may be performed. Below is a description of these forms of fraud:

Foreclosure Bailout

Victims of this form of real estate fraud are generally homeowners who have negative equity, also known as being "upside-down" and/or owe more money on their home's mortgage than the home is worth. They are caught in dire straits due to the need to sell their home, and must do so at a loss or let their mortgage company foreclose on their home. At this point a so called "bailout specialist" will offer the victim the opportunity to arrange for a short sale of their home. In this form of fraud, the homeowner usually will be told that for a fee of \$1,000 to \$2,500, the

homeowner can deed their home to the bailout specialist and then rent it back. The bailout specialist takes the money, does not arrange for the short sale, and does not make any payments on the mortgage. The end results are that the home loan payments are not made and the mortgage goes into foreclosure, without the victim being aware of any fraud. Ultimately, the home is foreclosed upon; the victim is evicted, and loses both his home and the \$1,000 to \$2,500 fee charged by the so-called specialist.

Home Equity and Home Renovation Fraud

According to the Council of Better Business Bureaus, home-remodeling contractors ranked slightly behind car salespersons and auto mechanics in generating the most consumer complaints. Be very careful when using your home or your home equity as security for a home improvement loan. Fast talking salespersons will offer to refinance your home at a lower interest rate to provide cash to the homeowner; the cash can be used to pay for home improvements or to pay off bills. Victims are frequently asked to sign blank contracts or contracts that they were not allowed to read before signing. Later, the homeowner discovers that they signed a contract that contains terms in contrast to the originally promised terms. This results in the loss of equity in the victim's home, and also they have signed a mortgage in which they have incurred considerably higher interest rates. The homeowner is now faced with a higher mortgage payment, one that they may not be able to afford.

Rental Fraud

Frequently, con artists will rent out a home they do not own. They will locate a vacant or abandoned home, enter the home, change the locks, and then advertise the property as available for rent. The unsuspecting victim rents the property from the con artist, who collects a security deposit and rent from the victim, and then disappears. The victim, who rented the property, is then evicted by the lawful owner and subsequently loses their place to live along with the money they paid for the security deposit and rent.

Deceptive Timeshares

Timeshares may offer to sell membership vacation accommodations. Con artists may make oral promises that are omitted from the written contract. They may also fail to mention fees and obligations that are in the written contract, which are never mentioned orally. These misrepresentations will likely be discovered while signing the contract and are downplayed by the salesperson as only "legal jargon". Victims are not told the extent to which the annual maintenance fee will increase over time, they will be forced to pay special assessment fees, or the difficulty to resale a timeshare.

Effects of Fraud

The crime of fraud is a personal violation. Although there is no serious physical injury, many victims of con artists suffer emotional harm by losing the following:

Financial security Family home Business Inheritance

Retirement savings or children's educational funds Professional or personal credibility



Conclusion

Victims of fraud come from a variety of racial, religious, socioeconomic, educational backgrounds, age, and gender. Some swindlers deliberately seek out families that may have limited means or financial difficulties, figuring such persons may be particularly receptive to a proposal that offers fast and large profits. Your first step as a victim should be to report the incident to your local police department. If you believe that you have become the victim of real estate

fraud, please contact your local law enforcement agency.

Senior Lead Officer(SLO) Beard is happy to report that year to date Residential Burglaries and Robberies are down in the Baldwin hills/Vista and Village Green communities. Residential Burglaries are down 22% so far this year compared to the same time period last year. Robberies are also down 8% within for the same time period. This reduction in crime can be attributed to the hard work by the officers of Southwest Division and diligent community members who care about the safety of their neighborhoods. Let's keep up the great work!

Unfortunately, there has also been an increase in graffiti within our community. The city of Los Angeles has a website that allows citizens to report graffiti in their community. Crime Tips- Earthquake Safety Tips:

Due to the recent events around the world with earthquakes and natural disasters, everyone should always be prepared for "*just in case*". There are several simple things to do in order to be prepared.

Secure it now...Conduct a "hazard hunt" to help identify and fix things such as unsecured <u>televisions</u>, <u>computers</u>, <u>bookcases</u>, furniture, unstrapped <u>water</u> <u>heaters</u>, etc.

Make a plan and Make disaster kits... Make sure that your emergency plan includes evacuation and reunion plans; your out-of-state contact person's name and number; the location of your emergency supplies and other pertinent information. Your disaster supplies kits should include food, water, flashlights, portable radios, batteries, a first aid kit, cash, extra medications, a whistle, fire extinguisher, etc.

Communicate and recover... Following a major disaster, communication will be an important step in

your recovery efforts. Turn on your portable radio for information and safety advisories.

According to Senior Lead Officer Sasajima, gang crime has seen an increase in the month of March, particularly in the area bordered by Sutro and Martin Luther King and Crenshaw-Vernon. Additionally, Leimert Park ended March on a somber note as a homicide took place at Sutro and Garthwaite on March 31, 2010 at approximately 1000 hrs. Southwest Officers are continuing their efforts to monitor the Crenshaw Corridor. Business owners have responded positively to the initiation of the Crenshaw Business Watch and officers have made several notable arrests for narcotic sales, illegal vending, and drinking in public.

Crime Tips- Crime Tips for Seniors

As people grow older, their chance of being victims of crime decreases dramatically. But a lifetime of experience coupled with the physical problems associated with aging often make older Americans fearful. Though they're on the lookout constantly for physical attack and burglary, they're not as alert to frauds and con games - in reality the greatest crime threat to seniors' well being and trust.

Want to conquer fear and prevent crime? Take these common-sense precautions.

Be Alert When Out and About

Go with friends or family, not alone.

Carry your purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.

Don't carry credit cards you don't need or large amounts of cash.

Use direct deposit for Social Security and other regular checks.

Whether you're a passenger or driver, keep car doors locked.

Be particularly alert in parking lots and garages. Park near an entrance.

Sit close to the driver or near the exit while riding the bus, train, or subway.

If someone or something makes you uneasy, trust your instincts and leave.

Find out more about protecting your home.

Make Your Home Safe and Secure

Install good locks on doors and windows. Use them! Don't hide keys in mailboxes and planters or under doormats.

Instead, leave an extra set of keys with a neighbor or friend.

Ask for photo identification from service or delivery people before letting them in. If you are the least bit worried, call the company to verify.

Watch Out for Con Artists

Don't fall for anything that sounds too good to be true - a free vacation, sweepstakes prizes, cures for cancer and arthritis, a low-risk, high-yield investment scheme.



Never give your credit card, phone card, Social Security, or bank account number to anyone over the phone. It's illegal for telemarketers to ask for these numbers to verify a prize or gift.



Don't let anyone rush you into signing anything - an insurance policy, a sales agreement, a contract. Read it carefully and have someone you trust check it over.

Beware of individuals claiming to represent companies, consumer organizations, or government agencies that offer to recover lost money from fraudulent telemarketers for a fee.

If you're suspicious, check it out with the police, the <u>Better Business Bureau</u>, or local consumer protection office. Call the <u>National Consumers League Fraud Information Center</u> at 800-876-7060.

Get Involved in the Community

Report any crime or suspicious activities to law enforcement.

Form a neighborhood watch to look out for each other and help the police.

Work to change conditions that hurt your neighborhood.

Senior lead Officer Anderson reports that there has been a slight increase in the number of street robberies along the Vermont Corridor between Martin Luther King Boulevard and Vernon Avenue. The robberies were all committed by different suspects during daytime hours. Due to vigilant response by officers, two of the robberies resulted in arrests, including the arrest of a man and woman.

As a reminder if you find yourself in a robbery situation do not confront the suspect. Be a good witness. Obtain a good description and direction of travel. Call 911 immediately. Try to avoid having anything of value visible on your person, including cell phones and Ipods.
